A message from the President

Greetings:

I hope everyone had a wonderful time over the holidays. Now it is back to our normal routine. The Museum had its best financial year ever in 2013. Income was about \$8358, thanks to a couple of \$500 donations by a faithful member, donations for new chairs for the flag room, members' dues, proceeds from our monthly dinners, and donations from Museum visitors. Our expenses were about \$6486, including insurance, alarm system, operating expenses, and the purchase of the new chairs, allowing us to put close to \$2000 in our savings account for unexpected expenses and hoped for building expansion. In previous years, our income and expenses were fairly closely matched in \$5000 - \$5500 range leaving little or nothing for savings.

We are hopeful that 2014 will be another good year. We are seeing an increase in visitors which makes our volunteers happy. We get lonely on days there are no visitors. During most days in Jan and Feb we had at least two visitors and we had 11 visitors on one day and 14 visitors on another. We are looking forward to a 22 March visit by 12 members of the Nash car club.

Did You Know That

the USS ESSEX, a 32 gun sailing frigate, became the first U.S. Navy ship to cross the Equator? The ESSEX was launched on 30 Sep 1799 and presented to the U.S. Navy on 17 Dec 1799. On 6 Jan 1800 USS ESSEX departed New York to meet and convoy merchant ships returning from Batavia, Dutch West Indies. On 7 Feb 1800 she crossed the Equator. The USS ESSEX participated in the Quasi-French War, the First Barbary War, and the War of 1812, during which she was captured by the British in March 1814. The Royal Navy renamed her HMS ESSEX and used her as a troop transport and later a prison ship. On 6 June 1837, the British sold HMS ESSEX at public auction for 1,230 pounds.

Military Sea Services Museum Member Leads Flag Day Parade.

John "Jack" Phillips long time Museum member was the Grand Marshal leading the 61st Flag Day Parade in Three Oaks, Michigan. The Parade held on 16 June 2013 in this small village of about 1700 people is known as the World's Largest Flag Day Parade with 100 plus units participating. Jack had been asked in previous years to lead the Parade, but he was too humble to consider himself worthy of the honor.

Before his death in El Salvador on 16 Feb, Mike Brown, a U.S. Army Special Forces veteran, nominated Jack as a deserving candidate and insisted that a World War II veteran living in Three Oaks should serve as Grand Marshal. Jack Phillips finally agreed. In a note to Museum member Allie Ryan, Jack stated in part that "...I got to be Grand Marshall...because of the information you sent." Jack and Allie were USS TERROR shipmates and remain close friends.

John "Jack" Phillips enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1942 at 17 years of age. He became a crew member of the World War II mine layer USS TERROR (CM-5) in the Pacific. Jack was aboard on 1 May 1945 when USS TERROR was hit by a Japanese kamikaze plane while anchored in Kerama Retto near Okinawa. The USS TERROR's crew of 481 suffered 41 dead, 7 missing, and 123 wounded. Jack survived the attack, was later transferred from the ship to attend Fleet Service School, and was honorably discharged in 1946.

The Museum's Board of Directors on behalf of all Museum members congratulate Jack on this well-deserved honor.
