

Black History Month is an annual observance originating in the United States, where it is also known as African American History Month. It has received official recognition from governments in the United States and Canada, and more recently has been observed in Ireland, and the United Kingdom. It began as a way of remembering important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. It is celebrated in **February** in the United States and Canada, while in Ireland, and the United Kingdom it is observed in **October.**

February was chosen as the month to celebrate Black History Month because the Black abolitionist and writer Frederick Douglass was born in this month, as was Abraham Lincoln, who played an important role in shaping Black history.



African Americans are one of the largest of the many ethnic groups in the United States. African Americans are largely the descendants of enslaved people.

Carter G. Woodson, American historian who first opened the long-neglected field of black studies to scholars and popularized the field in the schools and colleges of black people. To focus attention on black contributions to civilization, he founded (1926) Negro History Week.





Abraham Lincoln 16th president of the United States (1861–65), preserved the Union during the American Civil War and brought about the emancipation of enslaved people in the United States. Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation went into effect on 1/1/1863

A day of infamy!

The USS Nevada had the duty band for Morning Colors on that beautiful and serene Sunday morning. The attack rolled into the fleet moored in Pearl Harbor just before 0800hrs eighty years ago. Machine guns were strafing the ships and bombs began exploding while the band was in the middle of the Star-Spangled Banner. General quarters, battle station, this is not a drill, was called away. President F.D. Roosevelt declared war against Japan the very next day. 2,403 American's were killed in that attack and 1,478 were wounded. All 8 Pacific battleships were sunk or trapped in the harbor. In addition to the Hawaii attack, Japanese forces also attacked: Malaya, Hong Kong, Guam, the Philippines, Wake and Midway islands. The Japanese Empire should have let a sleeping dog lie. Within 4 years that nation was utterly devastated by military forces of the allied powers that united against her.
